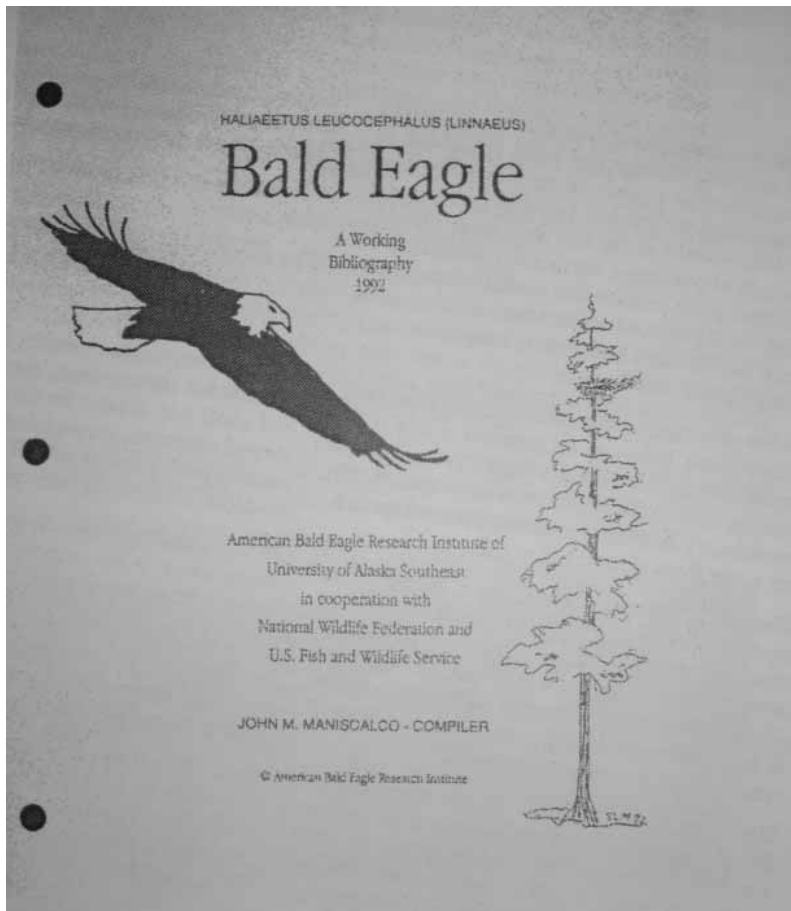


The Bald Eagle Bibliography

When it is sighted, our Nations emblem, the Bald Eagle, often causes people to stop and gaze in awe upon its majestic presence. While almost everyone could identify an eagle, few could easily access abundant data on *Haliaeetus leucocephalus*, the Bald Eagle. It was only recently that a comprehensive bibliography was compiled by John Maniscalco for the Bald Eagle Research Institute in cooperation with National Wildlife Federation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The National Wildlife Federation published the Bald Eagle bibliography in 1979, then gave the University of Alaska Southeast permission to update and maintain it. The bibliography is now housed in the William A. Egan library at the University of Alaska Southeast Juneau campus. Available via computer disk or hard copy, the bibliography will serve as an invaluable reference to those researching eagles.



Information on eagles which existed in the popular literature, newsletters, scientific journals, technical and status reports had been assembled by the National Wildlife Federation but was outdated (ca. 1976). The work of John Maniscalco in 1992 updated and organized the data and put it into a workable format, one that could be easily utilized by the novice or the master and made eagle information readily available to all.

With a bibliography compiled, plans exist to update it as it is feasible. In our rapidly advancing world, both ecologically and technologically the availability of this data becomes increasingly important. Those aware of the history of eagles may help ensure healthy populations for generations to come.
